Spotlight on Alumni! In this quarter we feature Angela Y. Landfair-Song, MD, MPH, Class of 2011.

# 1) What are you doing now?

I live with my husband Justin, and our two kids in Griffin (age 11) and Rowan (age 4) in Orinda, California. Justin was born and raised in Pittsburgh, but now he too says it is "cold" when it drops below 50 degrees. Orinda is a small town 20 minutes outside San Francisco famed for being named the "friendliest town in America" by Forbes. I work full time for Kaiser in Walnut Creek California with 3 partners. I have a 100% reconstructive practice, which was always a dream of mine. My practice is mostly breast reconstruction and general plastic surgery.

When I am not a full time plastic surgeon I am at my other full time job, which is being a hockey mom. If I am not hiking or working out, I am freezing in an ice rink somewhere.

## 2) Can you tell us a William Futrell story from residency?

I feel so fortunate that he was there during my residency. I remember meeting him for the very first time and he told me 1) to get interested in lymphatics and do it quickly and 2) that transgender surgery would become mainstream soon. This was 25 years ago and there were very few surgeons even performing lymphatic or gender affirming surgery. I swear he is always a few steps ahead. Just call him "Futurell!"

## 3) Is there a Pitt Resident story that stands out?

So many of the stories involve Dr. Russavage. I remember we had a patient with a terrible gunshot wound to the face. I was a PGY 5 and at the time there were no micro fellows. He came in and said, "what does this patient need?' and I answered that the patient needs multiple sural nerve grafts and an ALT free flap for soft tissue defect. He goes "good plan" and then just left the room. The junior resident and I stared at each other and then we just...did it. It is crazy to think about now. It is obvious to me NOW that he was right outside observing us like a hawk the whole time - but it was not back then!

Another story involved Dr. Manders. The recon team were finishing up a long day of OR - I think it was 6 pm or so - when we got the dreaded call from ENT that they "surprise!" needed a total pharyngoesophageal reconstruction (right now, so sorry). Anne Argenta was my junior - and she and I started and finished a flap that neither of us had ever done - a tubed ALT - while Dr. Manders sat next to us and told us the entire history of feudal Japan. Those of you who know Dr. Manders can totally picture this right now! We were delirious and laughing by the end of it - it was 1 am and Dr. Manders was still on year 300 of Shoguns.

I have lots of great Dr. Stofman stories, but as I said to him over the phone, none fit to print!

## 4) What does the Pitt Plastic Surgery education mean to you?

I often joke that we are all like vets, that our PTSD joins us together. But in all seriousness, what Pitt education did is make me realize that I can tackle any problem, and if I am stuck, I can always solve the problem with a smart friend/ co-surgeon in tow. No matter how challenging the problem, I found that I could take a deep breath and say to myself "well this is nothing compared to that one time at Pitt we..."

## 5) If you could have dinner with anyone past or present, who would it be?

Julia Child. I would get an amazing meal out of it (I assume she would be cooking!) but I think I am fascinated by her being the ultimate late bloomer. In today's world, twentysomethings are getting famous cooking on TikTok. Here is a woman who became a professional chef - at age 49 and got her first cooking show at 51! As I get older I am fascinated by these so called late bloomers who reinvented themselves and the world around them after 50. It is never too late to make waves.
