Spotlight on Alumni! In this quarter we feature William H. Dascombe, Graduating Class of 1994.

1) What are you doing now?

I graduated from Pitt Plastic Surgery in 1994 and I have been in private practice in Savannah, Georgia for 30 years. I work with two incredible Pitt Plastic Surgery grads, Rich Greco, and John Paletta. My other partners were trained by Bruce Mast, who trained with me at Pitt and one other partner. I hope to work at least another 10 years.

2) Can you tell us a William Futrell story from residency?

Dr. Scott Andochick, a fellow resident at the time, and I had a 110 pound woman who had massive weight loss and a ptotic "skin only" breast with a nipple to sternal notch distance of probably around 30 centimeters. She only wanted a breast lift and no implant. We had a tough time during the case with multiple "tailor-tacking" trials before making the final incisions. (You all remember: Measure twice. Cut once.) We finally did the procedure; the patient was happy with the results and Dr. Futrell called us into his office a few months later. He said that we billed the patient around \$3,000 and we used over \$6,000 just for suture (repeatedly tailor-tacking the breast until we were satisfied). I still owe Dr. Futrell a fine dinner for the economic misfortune that I bestowed upon the Division of Plastic Surgery at Pitt for that case!

3) Is there a Pitt Resident story that stands out?

At the 1994 annual Robert H. Ivy Pennsylvania Plastic Surgery Society Meeting/Surgery Resident paper competition, all of us were "trapped" by a blizzard for a couple of days at the Hotel Hershey, a beautiful 5-star resort. We had a great time as residents and faculty relaxing and enjoying each other's company outside of the operating room.

4) What does your Pitt Plastic Surgery education mean to you?

I did not deserve to be around such talented, motivated, and brilliant surgeons! I was always challenged to be my very best. I feel fortunate the Dr. Futrell and the other members of the faculty gave me the chance to be a resident at Pitt.

5) If you could have dinner with anyone past or present, who would it be?

Marcus Aurelius. He was the Roman Emperor from 161-180. I would thank him for his principles of leadership and living. They have served me well in surgery and life.
