Spotlight on Alumni! In this quarter we feature William A. Wooden, Graduating Class of 1992.

1. What are you doing now?

Currently, I am co-Chair of the Division of Plastic Surgery at the University of Indiana. I am a Program Director and Director of Surgical Quality at the system level for the entire university.

2. What are you doing during your free time?

We have a farm, seven chickens, four dogs! That will keep you busy. I have a new RV, a kayak, and a promise to my wife Juanita, that I will give her one long weekend per month, undisturbed for time together. I have a patent pending for our pre-surgical wellness program, optimizing patients for surgery, using modalities, such as immunonutrition. This takes up a considerable amount of time.

3. Can you share with us a Bill Futrell story?

We were at the Association meeting and all the big shots, the "Who's Who" in Plastic Surgery, were all in attendance. Ross Musgrave was at the meeting and Dr. Futrell had this water gun apparatus and he kept shooting into Dr Musgrave's head. It made me feel uncomfortable because I was not sure how to respond. Neither did Dr. Musgrave because he did not know where the water was coming from. He kept looking at the ceiling, thinking there was a leak! I got a kick out of that. I also remember Dr. Futrell never tied his shoes. I could not figure out why he never tripped on his laces; then it dawned on me that he used shorter laces, every shoe he owned became essentially a slip-on loafer! He was ahead of his time!

4. Can you tell us about a resident story that may bring out a chuckle?

Howard Edington was a young attending. He would always tell me that if you have a problem, do not bring a shovel, bring a "Wooden!" I had a tangle with a young new general surgeon on the staff over management of a tracheoesophageal fistula. The patient had radiation therapy to the neck, and they asked me to form an opinion. I had just completed a head and neck reconstructive fellowship and felt pretty comfortable in this arena. He gave me some unfavorable feedback, and I was not pleased on how it went down. Being 6'3 and 250 pounds I found a way to get my message across. Dr Edington called me the "bulldogger" thereafter!

5. What did the Pitt Plastic Surgery education mean to you?
