Spotlight on Alumni! In this quarter we are spotlighting Kodi K. Azari, Class of 2003.

1) What are you doing now?

I am a full professor at UCLA in the Department of Orthopedic Surgery, with an appointment in Plastic Surgery. I primarily work in the Ortho Department; I also have an appointment in the Division of Transplantation because of our exceptionally large composite tissue transplant service. My practice is solely hand surgery, which is made up of residents, fellows and med students.

2) What do you with your free time?

I spend much of my time outdoors; I live in a beautiful part of Los Angeles, not too far from Malibu. I am an avid cyclist, both road and mountain biking. I try to swim two miles two to three times per week, and I enjoy skiing. My children are ages 11 and 14 and they are involved in many of our activities.

3) Can you give me a Dr. Futrell story from residency?

Well, like everyone, I have a lot of funny stories cause we all know how quirky he can be! I was with him on one of his lowest days professionally. I do not want to go into it, but I walked into his office unknowingly what had transpired. All he did was talk to me on how he could try and help promote my career and support my efforts. The discussion was all about me. This speaks volumes to his commitment to Pitt Plastic Surgery and his trainees; his loyalty and devotion is what makes him so special.

4) Can you give us resident story that stands out?

I went through a number of surgeries, including a gunshot wound to the hand, that I took the attendings through. I was very excited.

5) What is your five-year plan?

I would like to continue to grow our composite tissue transplant service. From a philanthropic standpoint, I would like to raise enough money to create a unified hand center at UCLA. That would be one of my goals.

6) If you could have dinner with anyone, now or in the past, who would it be?

Clearly it would be my father. I was a very young man when he passed. I would love to share time with him now as an adult and give him the opportunity to see what I have accomplished. He would be very proud. He played a tremendous role in my development and character.
